'But I am sure Peter will make up for it next year."

Extraordinary Efforts for Excellence turned out to be an unusual fundraising event that was entertaining, meaningful and immensely fun. The wide expanse of space that fronted One World Hotel's Grand Ballroom was filled with people

milling around in a wide variety of fin-- older gentlemen in suits and batik shirts, socialites here and there with their coiffed hair and flowy dresses, the corporate chic look with ties, skirts and jackets, and plenty of children who needed nothing more than their wide smiles to fit right in.

Selected works by local artist allentan were on display, and it was heart warming to see him talk to several groups of children who were more than eager to ask about the vibrant colours and faces in his paintings, allentan had a short break when a magician's act held everyone spellbound for a half hour performance, but the children came running back soon after. The magician went in search of other 'victims", and was seen trying his expert sleight of hand on several unsuspecting

The family carnival vibe extended inside the ballroom, right from the very energetic emcee to the kind of songs that was being performed by the very talented Reena - who also belted out a few Mandarin and Hokkien classics. A pictorial tribute to Michael Jackson was a worthy delay to the eight-course Chinese dinner that was served, especially when MJ himself took to the stage - impersonator Rezo, who bore an uncanny resemblance to the King of Pop, right down to the curly wisps of hair and thin frame. When Options first spoke to Goh about the event in November, he had promised four hours of solid entertainment, and that he certainly delivered with a cornucopia of events that graced the stage - a dance medley, a beat box performance by 17-year-old Sean Lee and a special appearance by entertainer extraordinaire Datuk Leonard Tan. Dessert was about to be served when there was a charity auction of allentan's two art pieces, which raised a total of RM20.500.

The four beneficiary charities - My Kasih, Pusat Penjagaan Kanak Kanak Cacat Taman Megah, StART Society and

the Alzheimer's Disease Foundation Malaysia - received a total of RM325.000. while a contribution totalling RM1.45 million was given to the Montfort Boys Town in Shah Alam and the Montfort Youth Centre in Melaka.

But the news that really got the cheers going was Ho's announcement of a special study loan fund with a RM1 million contribution from ECM Libra Foundation, ECM Libra, EMC2 and The Edge will form a working group to select

eligible recipients of the study loan. Most unique about the programme is its focus - which includes lower achievers who may be equally, if not more, deserving of assistance.

"We feel that right now, most existing student aid programmes tend to focus on top performers and only in certain areas of studies like science, finance and engineering, thereby underserving those who do need assistance but are not top performers, and those who may be taking courses in the social sciences and liberal arts," he said.

The clock had struck 11pm by the time

the ballroom began to empty - clearly many parents had decided that the event was worth delaying their children's bedtimes for. The positive energy that the event began with lasted until the last teacup was cleared from the last table. Then again, events that are held with altruistic reasons in mind often have that impact: the cost of buying tables at such functions is nothing compared to the feel-good factor that is generated and the hope they inspire. It was a wonderful end to a rather dreary year. Here's to good things and more extraordinary efforts for excellence in 2010.
