> "Health is wealth," said Jamilah explained how Juita aimed to enc the Orang Asli community to ta sponsibility for their health. She e sised that the community must we wards ensuring its health by ad good habits and keeping its neigl hood clean.

> She said the Orang Seletar villa Kampung Bakar Batu, Kampung S Temon and Kampung Simpang will be cleaned as a gotong-royo.

> Bridges and jetties in these villag be repaired, while regular health will be organised for the villagers.

Through the research conducted by various local universities, it was discovered that the Orang Seletar have their own culture.

Jamilah said the marketable skills acquired under Juita's Income-Generating Skills programme can help them develop a business to ensure a financially stable future for their families.

Jamilah encouraged the locals to enrol for the entrepreneur courses designed to train them in skills such as foot reflex-

ology and spa management, cooking, pastry-making, food and beverage packaging, tailoring, hairdressing, handicraft-making, childminding, nursery care and gardening.

These courses, she said, will equip and enable the Orang Asli to start a business.

At the event, 70 underprivileged families from the three villages received a sum of RM250 each, out of which RM200 was in the form of credit stored in their MyKad, while RM50 was presented to them with sponsorship from MyKasih Foundation.

Using the MyKad credit facility, a cardholder can shop for basic necessities at Giant Hypermarket Tampol and pay the amount electronically.
