Children from 15 schools to benefit from joint programme

TOTAL of 717 primary and secondary schoolchildren from 15 schools will benefit from 'Rotary Kasih'.

The programme, which was launched in SJK (T) Vivekananda, Kuala Lumpur, aims to relieve the burden of poor families while motivate underprivileged students to achieve academic success.

The project adopts the MyKasih 'Love My School' cashless bursary scheme where students are able to draw down on monthly allowances of RM60 to RM80 and pay for items sold at the school canteen and bookstore using their Rotary Kasih Smartcard.
