Dear Friends,

he strict nationwide lockdown put in place almost a year ago to tackle COVID-19 has given rise to the new 'pandemic poor' in Malaysia. The hardest hit are not only those living below the poverty line, but also the bottom 40 per cent of income earners, the B40 group.

In March 2020, MyKasih embarked on a fund-raising campaign to reach out to B40s affected by the pandemic and help put food on the table. RM 3 million was raised and distributed to more than 12,000 families nationwide in the form of food. We are deeply grateful to all the donors who have responded to our appeal and to our partner retail outlets who continue to serve our beneficiaries. As we enter year 2021 with the likelihood of an extended Movement Control Order (MCO), we have since raised RM 17 million and are aiming to raise more funds to support families in dire straits. We hope donors will feel inspired to support this effort to relieve families from the stress and desperation they are facing.

Our cashless welfare distribution system was made available to corporations and civil society at no cost to enable them to respond quickly to appeals which exploded during the initial phases of the pandemic. By leveraging on retail partners, families supported under the programme are able choose for themselves the food items they need, and to purchase them only when they need it. This convenience not only minimises food wastage, it also removes the health and safety risks towards social workers and volunteers who would otherwise have to procure, pack and deliver food aid to the families during the critical MCO period.

I am delighted to share that MyKasih Foundation has since been appointed by Yayasan Hasanah to implement the Malaysian Government's 'PRIHATIN Kasih' cashless food aid programme worth RM 90 million for 300,000 urban poor nationwide.

The 300,000 families will be aided with a monthly cashless allowance of RM 100 via their MyKad for 3 months, to purchase essential food items at participating retail outlets within their neighbourhood.

At the same time, the Johor State Government has also announced a RM 200 food aid scheme to 300,000 of Johor's pandemic poor, to be disbursed using MyKasih's cashless payment system.

We are indeed encouraged that both Yayasan Hasanah and the Johor State Government have chosen to leverage on the cashless payment system to distribute aid to the B40s.

While schools have been closed for the most part of 2020, we would like to highlight positive outcomes of our investments in the Love My School (LMS) initiative, namely on robotics and aquaponics. We are currently assessing the needs of the 112 schools we have under the LMS programme to determine how we can best support the students with their learning.

Separately, we were also able to provide two groups of women in Selangor and Penang with income-generation opportunities through sewing of personal protective equipment (PPEs). These PPEs were subsequently donated to hospitals in Sabah to help the front-liners there battle the pandemic.

Much more needs to be done as appeals for aid continue to pour in. I hope we can work together to serve the vulnerable and marginalised meaningfully and effectively, as we navigate these trying pandemic times.

E stablished in 2009, MyKasih Foundation is a charity organisation founded by DIALOG's Executive Chairman Tan Sri Dr Ngau Boon Keat and his wife Puan Sri Jean Ngau, to help low-income families through food aid and education regardless of race, religion or descent.

MyKasih not only aims to improve nutrition through its food aid programme but also strives to transform the families through skills training and education, especially for their children, to break the poverty cycle and give them hope for a better future.

What is significant is that MyKasih uses leading-edge

technology to support its aid distribution. The MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme and the MyKasih 'Love My School' student bursary scheme run on an efficient cashless payment system developed by DIV Services Sdn Bhd, a subsidiary of DIALOG.

All disbursements and payments are effected through the use of the MyKad, which is the chip-based ID card issued to all Malaysians. Use of the MyKad allows us to target aid to the right person, enabling us to distribute aid in an efficient, transparent and secure way. This feature is probably the first of its kind in welfare distribution in the world.

OUR FOOD AID PROGRAMME...

The MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' is a cashless food aid programme which reaches out to families earning a combined monthly household income of RM 1,500 and below. Recipients receive a monthly allowance of RM 80 through their MyKad account, which can be spent on approved essential items at partner retail outlets.

The approved food items range from ten different product categories such as rice, noodles, bread, biscuits, eggs, seasoning, flour, cooking oil, canned food and beverages. The list of approved items can be expanded to include basic household appliances and schooling necessities for post-disaster relief.



OUR STUDENT BURSARY PROGRAMME...

Under the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary programme, students from economically-challenged backgrounds are given annual bursaries via a smartcard linked to their MyKad account, to pay for meals at the school canteen and to purchase school books and stationery from the school bookshop.

Additional support is rendered through sponsorship of extra tuition classes, study camps, English literacy and numeracy workshops, and computer labs for 21st century learning. Robotics, aquaponic projects and sports activities are also funded to enhance their learning experience in school.



OUR ORANG ASLI CHILDREN'S EDUCATION FUND...

School dropouts are most rampant amongst the Orang Asli, and the single, greatest contributing factor to the dropout is poverty. The 'Orang Asli Children's Education Fund' was set up to support indigenous children in national schools and those attending after-school classes at community learning centers.

In catering to the unique needs of the community, the fund ensures that Orang Asli children, especially those in rural areas, are not left behind and are able to attain an education and an opportunity to develop to their fullest potential.



OUR SUPPLEMENTARY ASSISTANCE PROGRAMMES...

In our effort to help our beneficiaries break out of the poverty cycle, we work with training partners to provide skills and entrepreneurship training to empower them with knowledge and skills to realise their full potential and achieve financial independence.

Additionally, health awareness programmes and screenings are done in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and the National Population and Family Development Board (locally known as 'LPPKN') to support the holistic well-being of our beneficiaries.



HOW YOU CAN HELP...

We rely on funding from donors to carry out all of the above community and school programmes. Companies are welcome to adopt MyKasih's programmes and brand them accordingly as part of their on-going corporate social responsibility initiatives.



Every ringgit goes a long way in making a difference. All cash donations to MyKasih Foundation are tax-exempt and are passed in full to the beneficiaries.



All donations are passed in full to beneficiaries via their MyKad or MyKasih smartcard.


MyKasih Today

MyKasih started with a pilot MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid project involving 25 families back in 2009. By 2021, we would have channelled **RM 380 million** via the MyKasih cashless payment system to more than **600,000 families** in over 400 locations nationwide, out of which, 20,000 are primary and secondary student beneficiaries aided through the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary scheme.



The scope of the MyKasih system has expanded beyond food aid and student bursaries to include cashless payments for public transportation, fuel, medical treatments and utility bills. Essentially, the MyKad account becomes the single main account to which low-income households can use to access multiple welfare products or services.

The Ministry of Urban Wellbeing, Housing and Local Government, Johor and Sarawak State Governments, Lembaga Zakat Selangor, Zakat Pulau Pinang and Majlis Agama Islam Melaka, have also been using the innovative MyKasih system for their respective welfare programmes for the underprivileged.

Even though the COVID-19 pandemic had caused school closures throughout the country, some LMS programmes were still able to run successfully. Below is a general summary of outcomes of the LMS programmes.

i) Student attendance and participation in online learning

With schools closed for most of the year, student attendance was adversely affected (< 50%).

Participation in online learning for MyKasih's B40 students was below 25% (near zero for some), as many families do not have access to computers and internet connection at home

ii) Sports development

LMS initiative includes programmes that encourage Science, All field games and sports activities were prohibited during Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) education the MCO, under MOE directives. through the sponsorship of computer labs, aquaponic edible gardens and robotics equipment.

iii) Computer labs and robotics

MyKasih encourages Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) education through the sponsorship of computer labs, aquaponic edible gardens and robotics equipment.

To date, RM 627,000 worth of LEGO Mindstorm EV3 robotics kits have been given to MyKasih schools.

In September 2020, the Ministry of Education (MOE) and Sasbadi held a robotics workshop for 29 MyKasih OA primary schools. The workshop saw teachers from the Pahang, Terengganu, Kelantan, Perak and Selangor OA schools coming together in Kuantan to be trained on the robotics modules.

Between 22 and 29 October, MyKasih students submitted their entries for the 2020 Virtual National Robotics Competition (VNRC). The VNRC is a highimpact educational programme organised by the MOE and Sasbadi to develop students' interest and skills in STEM.

The VNRC for the Primary and Secondary School Categories saw 159 students from 40 MyKasih schools participating, out of which, 104 were OA students from 26 Orang Asli primary schools in Johor, Perak, Pahang, and Kelantan.

Schools in KL and Selangor could not participate in the VNRC due to school closures.

Success Stories

Participation from Orang Asli schools

Indigenous students are not left behind in 21st century learning!

For the first time in history, 104 OA students from 26 MyKasih-supported schools competed in a national robotics competition which received entries from 1,400 students representing 800 schools nationwide.



Achievements by Orang Asli students

Eight OA primary school students from two MyKasihsupported schools - SK Kampung Layau in Pengerang, Johor, and SK Permatang Keledang in Pekan, Pahang, achieved commendable rankings in the national competition. They later went on to compete in the World Robot Olympiad Robot Virtual Games (held between 9-11 November 2020) and Robot Virtual Games International Championship 2020 (held between 4-6 December 2020) where they continued to achieve commendable rankings for first-time participants competing against students from countries such as China, Mexico, Panama, Philippines, Italy, USA and

iv) Aquaponics edible garden project

MyKasih-supported schools have had the aquaponics system set up to serve as an outdoor classroom as well as a food source for the students and the surrounding community.

RM 50,000 was allocated this year for consumables (fish food and vegetable seeds) as well as maintenance for the 40 aquaponic systems.



DIALOG Group has sponsored 33 sets of aquaponics systems to-date for schools adopted under the MyKasih Love My School programme. The aquaponics edible garden project serves as an outdoor classroom which imparts STEM learning in a fun and interactive way.



Germinated seeds from the grow beds are placed into sponges and transferred into the aquaponic system's vertical towers to continue growing.

Some positive feedback from the schools:-

- Students learn new skills in modern farming, food production and entrepreneurship
- Students are able to consume fresh vegetables and fish
- Students are more interested to attend school as lessons have become more interactive and exciting
- Teachers are motivated to apply new teaching methods using the aquaponics system which are exciting for the students
- Students are not left behind in STEM
- School compound is beautified with lush green edibles ('Taman Akuaponik' or 'Aquaponic Park')
- Communities surrounding the schools have also shown interest in aquaponics and have been inquisitive and more engaging

Yayasan Hasanah Equips 528 Students With Back-To-School Essentials



In October 2020, Yayasan Hasanah in collaboration with Khazanah Nasional Berhad, began providing Back-To-School support for 528 underprivileged students to help them prepare for the 2021 academic year.

The aid, given over a period of three months from October to December 2020, was channelled via the MyKasih 'Love My School' cashless bursary programme. The beneficiaries were identified from various schools, especially those located within underserved communities whose livelihoods were, and still are, significantly impacted by COVID-19.

The cashless Back-To-School programme, launched in eight schools across Johor, Kedah, Kelantan, Kuala Lumpur, Perak and Pahang, saw each student receiving RM 60 (primary students) and RM 80 (secondary students) in monthly bursaries via their MyKad-linked student smartcard to purchase learning essentials at their school bookstore. The bursaries could also be used to pay for meals at the school canteen.

This initiative follows an earlier RM 150,000 grant given by Yayasan Hasanah to support families with food aid from July to September 2020. Both initiatives were part of Yayasan Hasanah's effort to lessen the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Malaysia's B40 communities. To date, Yayasan Hasanah's food aid programme has benefited a total of 105,174 beneficiaries through its Hasanah Special Grant 2020 and Hasanah Disaster Relief Funds.

HSBC Drives Economic **Transformation In OA Communities**

Over the last two years, MyKasih has embarked on community development programmes to help drive income-generation. The livelihood programmes in selected Orang Asli (OA) villages in Perak and Pahang encompass fruit and vegetable farming, as well as fish and chicken rearing.

From 20 to 23 August 2020, 44 OA participants from Perak and Pahang completed an organic farming training at SEEDS Malaysia in Selangor, where they learned ecological farming concepts such as how to make compost and manage pests using materials available within their villages.

The learning continued between 31 August and 3 September, where 21 Orang Asli participants from the same villages participated in a second farming course which included training on aquaculture (fish farming).

Upon returning to their respective villages, the OAs of Kampung Cunex in Gerik immediately began constructing fish ponds to rear the prized ikan kelah (mahseer).



In Kampung Bertang, near Raub, Pahang, the Semai Asli community were busy expanding their chicken coups to add another 500 chickens into their chicken farming income-generation project (bringing it to a total capacity of 1,500 chickens). The chicken farming project will also be implemented in a neighbouring village, Kampung Sungai Ruai, as part of the HSBC's project expansion plans.

All of the above progress in the communities demonstrates the OA's willingness to learn new skills and apply them to improve their economic livelihood. This community development initiative is part of MyKasih's transformation agenda to empower beneficiaries with skills and knowledge to develop resilient and self-sufficient communities.



Meanwhile, the Asli of Kampung Ong Jelmol went into composting in a big way to fertilise their soils with the hope of increasing their vegetable and fruit farm yields.

Sabah MCO Food Aid Support

Later in November 2020, HSBC contributed another RM 115,000 to support 1,150 families in various locations in Sabah with RM 100 one-off food aid each, as appeals from communities affected by the COVID-19 MCO escalated due to the drastic increased in the number of COVID-19 cases in the state.

Linde Global Pitches In To Help Families Cope With Pandemic



struggles Malaysian communities who were financially impacted by the Movement Control Order (MCO) were heard by Linde, whose global offices pitched in with funding amounting to RM 90,000 to support 630 families with essentials.

In caring for communities, 210 out of the 630 beneficiary families are located in Kuching, Sarawak, Pasir Gudang in Johor, and Kota Kinabalu in Sabah, where Linde has business operations. From July to September 2020, these families received RM 100 each month via their Mykad account to make cashless purchases of provisions at MyKasih's partner retail outlets within their neighbourhood.

12 volunteers from Linde Malaysia, led by their Area Manager Operations for South / East Malaysia, Mohd Ekhwan Hadi, went shopping with 70 families at Mydin Taman Rinting in Pasir Gudang, Johor, on 11 July 2020.

In addition to the 70 Pasir Gudang families, Linde also aided 560 families in Kuching, Kota Kinabalu, Kuala Terengganu in the east coast, Sungai Petani in Kedah, as well as the Orang Asli from Pos Sinderut in Pahana. Segamat in Johor and Pos Piah in Perak.

'Program ROSE' Free Cervical Cancer Screening

R.O.S.E.: Removing Obstacles to Cervical ScrEening

Free cervical cancer screening was organised for MyKasih communities from Bukit Lanjan in Selangor, PPR Batu in Kuala Lumpur, and Kuala Nerus in Kuala Terengganu in July and August 2020.

89 women were successfully screened by ROSE Foundation using easy-to-use self-sampling kits. The ROSE self-sampling kit is the latest, unique non-invasive method of carrying out the screening. Instead of the conventional pap smear conducted by a healthcare professional, involving a pelvic examination, Program ROSE offers women the choice of using a self-swab: a quick, convenient and effective approach to enable tests to be undertaken followed by prompt delivery of results straight to women's mobile phone.

During the programme, the women were each given a self-sampling kit and were briefed on how to obtain samples. Samples are then barcode scanned for records and tracking before they are sent to a diagnostic lab in Petaling Jaya. The women received their results three weeks later via the e-health platform mobile app. Should they test positive for cervical cancer, they will be contacted by ROSE Foundation for further checks at a University Malaya Medical Centre (UMMC).

Once the MCO is lifted, MyKasih plans to roll out Program ROSE in more communities.

ROSE FOUNDATION

Rose Foundation was established in 2019 as a company limited by guarantee and as a charitable foundation in Malaysia. It is a joint venture between the University of Malaya and VCS Foundation (VCS, formerly the Victorian Cytology Service Inc.), Australia. ROSE Foundation also runs the ROSE Laboratory to provide a centralised cervical screening service using HPV testing.

ROSE Foundation has set itself the ambitious goal of making Malaysia one of the first nations in the region to be free of cervical cancer. To achieve this, the Foundation's ROSE Program (Removing Obstacles to cervical ScrEening) was launched on 14 January 2019 by the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Women, Family and Community Development, Dato' Seri Dr Wan Azizah Wan Ismail. Both the Ministry of Women, Family Community Development and the Ministry of Health are also moving towards eliminating cervical cancer in Malaysia, and Program ROSE is playing a pivotal role in accelerating the process.

Program ROSE started off as Pilot Project ROSE, a research project led by University of Malaya. The aim of this pilot project was to assess the acceptability, feasibility and reach of a novel cervical screening strategy that utilized self-sampling in primary care settings, HPV (Human Papillomavirus) testing and follow-up of screened positive women in a tertiary hospital in Malaysia.

Yayasan Pasir Gudang Continues *Smart Food* **Programme With MyKasih**



In August 2020, Yayasan Pasir Gudang (YPG) renewed their one-year commitment towards the 'Smart Food' cashless food aid programme. The initiative aims to support 240 families with monthly food aid worth RM 80, amounting to a total pledge of RM 230,400 jointly funded by DIALOG Group Berhad and YPG.

YPG began leveraging on MyKasih's cashless distribution system to run its own food aid programme since 2015. In 2017, YPG extended the welfare programme to 100 primary school students from Sekolah Kebangsaan Pasir Gudang, who were aided via the MyKasih 'Love My School' bursary programme.

Last year, 240 families with household earnings of RM 350 per capita and below received RM 80 every month via their MyKad account to shop for basic provisions at designated outlets such as Redmart, Econsave, and IMCOOP.

We are deeply grateful to Yayasan Pasir Gudang for their trust in our welfare distribution system all these years. We are happy to provide our cashless platform to any agency or non-profit organisation which serves B40 Malaysia.

JTI Responds To Urgent **Appeals For Food Aid**

As many families looked forward to celebrating Christmas and ushering the New Year, 70 families in the rural interiors of Kampung Selaor and Kampung Kelab in Gerik, Perak, were waiting for provisions to be delivered by their community members.

Kg Selaor and Kg Kelab were first aided in January 2018 when floods had cut their access to town. Faced with the situation of increased hunger. the villagers had to trek for one day to meet the transporter at a meeting point where the goods could be dropped off as the roads towards their villages were impassable, made worse by

damage caused by elephants and the monsoon.

With the provisions purchased in a cashless manner via the MyKasih 'Love My Neighbourhood' food aid programme, the two Jahai Orang Asli communities, and 900 other families nationwide, need not worry about sustenance.

JTI also provided RM 100 one-off food aid support to 300 families in Sabah and RM 10,000 (via MyKasih) to Kuala Lumpur-based NGO, Buku Jalanan Chow Kit.

III Provides Income-**Generation For** Seamstresses, PPE For **Frontliners**

JTI continues to empower women creating income-generation 20 opportunities. B40 women (including single mothers) in Selangor and Penang, who were previously trained with sewing, were engaged to produce personal protective equipment (PPE) for Sabah's frontliners. This initiative was to help them cope with caring for their dependents during the pandemic, in addition to providing Sabah's healthcare personals with much needed PPE supplies.

With the support of social enterprise SURI Lifestyle in Selangor and the Permatang Pauh Women's Project in Penang, RM 100,000 was channelled towards labour and material costs to produce PPE. A total of 4,200 isolation gowns, 4,200 hoods (head covers) and

5,000 boot covers were produced and delivered to Jabatan Kesihatan Negeri Sabah to help frontliners deal with the high number of COVID-19 cases when Sabah was under lockdown with most of its districts in red zones and under strict movement control order.

The sewing skills training programme by Mostwell started in November 2018, funded by JTI Malaysia, and since then, the women have been participating in bazaars and handicraft markets to sell their products while being mentored on their cottage businesses. Prior to the lockdown, at least 6 of the 16 women were earning more than RM 1,000 - RM 1,500 monthly, while the others were earning RM 50 - RM 150 monthly as a supplementary income.

Lee Yeow Seng Empowers Indigenous Youths To Be Changemakers

In December 2020, 11 Orang Asal completed their students year vocational stint at the Guwas Koposizon College (GKC) School for Experiential and Entrepreneurship Development Sabah (SEEDS) run by PACOS Trust.

This class of 2019/20 was fully sponsored by Lee Yeow Seng, Unlike most vocational and entrepreneurship training programmes which train students for employment in the city, this programme was designed to equip graduates with skills which they can apply within their respective villages to help their community achieve food security and progress with economic opportunities.

Among the graduates are seven Temiar Orang Asli youths from Gerik, Perak, between the age of 16 and 25 year. Other graduates are local Sabahans from Kota Belud and Penampang.

The programme focused on building fundamental skills in organic farming and food technology entrepreneurship, English, communication, character building, as well as on the job training and internship.

Towards the end of their first year. each student spent three months as an intern in a field of their choice, ranging from farming, catering, handicraft making, to setting up of hybrid solar systems and civil work for building the intake and forebay of micro-hydro systems. Their teachers also introduced the basics of entrepreneurship to get them started on their business idea and plan.

When the COVID-19 MCO came into force during their second year at GKC, the students had to spend most of their final year on campus at the Lomunu Courage Farm. The students used the opportunity to focus intensely on implementing what they learnt and worked hard on their organic vegetable plot and compost production. Based on their respective interests, some delved further into areas such as chicken rearing, kelulut bee (stingless bee) farming and handicraft making.

The graduates have now returned to their respective villages with plans to share their newfound skills with their community. Among their immediate plans include starting businesses selling organic fertilisers, handicraft, starting a chicken farm and implementing new farming techniques learnt such as System of Rice Intensification (SRI).

In addition to the sponsorship of the students, Lee Yeow Seng also supports an Orang Asli teacher's training programme for rural community learning centers, known as Pusat Didikan Komuniti.
